LONG EATON INQUIRY

KING OF SCOTS BARRED FROM RACING BY STEWARDS
A stewards' inquiry was held at the close of Long Eaton dog race meeting last night, as a result of the running of King of Scots in the final of Grade C of the Track Sweepstakes.

King of Scots started a hot favourite, but after running with the leaders to the second last bend, stopped and failed to finish.

It will be remembered that the same dog stopped when leading in his heat. The stewards, after hearing the evidence of the 'vet' that the dog was in a fit condition to run when he entered the kennel, the evidence of the starter that he was in a fit condition to run when he entered the track, and the evidence of the stewards on duty that no interference took place during the race, decided that King of Scots' stopping was due only to inexperience of racing.

They decided to inform his trainer that the dog would not be allowed to run in public again until he had proved to trials his ability to finish the course.

CAN DERBYSHIRE BREAK CHESHIRE SPELL?

SEVEN YEARS' SEQUENCE OF DEFEAT MAY END THIS WEEK

Following Derbyshire's narrow victory over Warwickshire in a county golf match, there are, this week, the Cheshire match and the Derbyshire Professional Championship, both at Burton-on-Trent.

There is just a chance of winning the Cheshire game for the first time since the counties met each other in 1923. Much depends, however, on whether Derbyshire can bring out a strong team. Tom Barber, the new Derbyshire professional, holds the championship.

It is the ordinary way of county golf matches are not characterised by those exciting finishes which are so frequent in first-class cricket. In fact, Derbyshire's game against Warwickshire at Buxton last week was the exception which proves the rule.

It was a near thing, and when two of the late starters, Dr. C. R. C. Moor and A. V. Nutt, came home on the wrong side, it looked bad for Derbyshire. But they were then all square with C. J. Parr and J. E. L. Marshall still to come in. Fraser got a brilliant three for the last to finish all square with Parr, so that the match was still even with only one couple to go.

Records Broken. Marshall, in the meantime, had completely overhauled Wakefield, and there was joy in the Derbyshire camp when it became known that by the narrowness of margins they had recorded their first win of the season.

Two Derbyshire records were set in this match, by losing two down to H. Arnold, the Midlands amateur champion, the county captain, the Rev. W. H. Foster-Pegg was defeated for the first time in his county career on his own course at Buxton.

The captain has invariably been a safe man at Buxton, but as president of the English Union he has had a worrying time lately. His dual capacity of principal official and competitor in the English championship at Buxton, to say nothing of refereeing the final, took a lot of time, and he was not able to take his usual part in the game.

It seems strange to see him thinking twice about short putts and missing one or two. The only other feature of the match which calls for comment is the introduction of Long, who now plays off two on the Buxton course. He has been resident in the town only about twelve months and before this he played for Cumberland.

He is a really sound player who will be very useful in Derbyshire ranks as time passes. He had the unusual distinction of winning both his batsman and bowler on the occasion of his first appearance for the county. Things are now appearing thick and fast in the Derbyshire golfing world.
