The final of this year's English Amateur golf championship at Ganton produced some of the worst play ever seen in such an event and the visits of both players to the gorse were numerous. In the morning Woollam could hit nothing straight and in the afternoon Bourn could do nothing right and lost by 4 and 3. T. A. Bourn, of Sunningdale, was formerly of Cambridge University, while J. Woollam is a Cheshire business man who entered from the Hooton Club. In the final both players scattered the crowd with erratic shots. On the last afternoon Bourn played three provisional balls in the first six holes, but some of his pitching and putting was excellent. Woollam, all to pieces in the morning, then pulled himself together and became a different player altogether. Bourn won the title in 1930.
