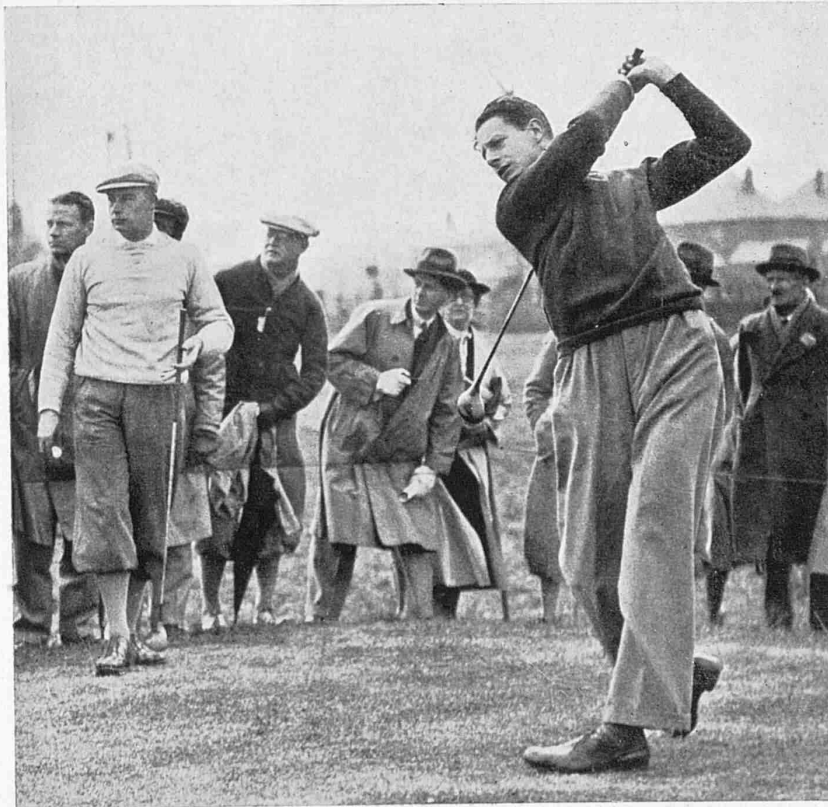
J. McLean and Ross Somerville Beaten on the First Day at St. Annes



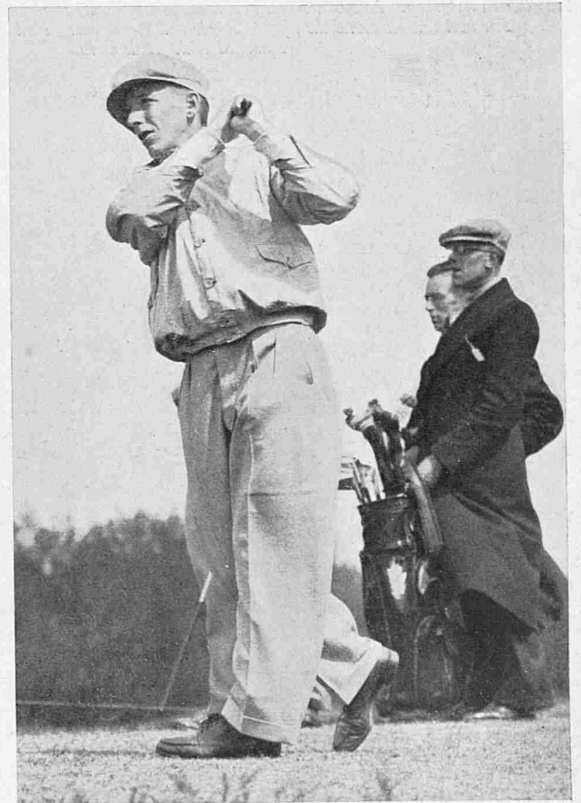
