## Qualifying Rounds Completed

WARRINGTON, WEDNESDAY. eatened early in the morn-Rain threatened early in the morning to damp the spirit of the 93 competitors in the Cheshire county amateur championship on the Warrington club's course at Appleton to-day, but a spectagly wind although blowing from course at Appleton to day, but a westerly wind, although blowing from a teasing direction across the holes, did police duty by keeping the clouds moving and sent the rain about its business in other quarters. Warrington had had rain with the exception of one day for the past week, however, and the course was playing long. The greens,

course was playing long. The greens, normally slow, were almost defiant of the putter's strength; the undulating course is studded with trees, ominous sentinels beckoning to the ball hit off the line, and to the golfer things of beauty only after they have been safely passed. All told, the conditions were so difficult that early 76's wore more than a respectable air, and finally an aggregate of 163 for 36 holes failed to qualify for the match-play stages, which begin to-morrow among the 32 survivors.

While we were trying to compute a qualifying aggregate sufficiently generous to forgive the lapses of the competitors A. Walker (Delamere) shattered our speculations by bringing in a first-round card of 71, four strokes under par, which led the returns by three strokes from K. B. Taylor (Wilmslow). Walker began auspiciously with an eagle three; his second shot to the first green (433 yards) was five yards past the pin, and he holed his putt. The second hole tried to intimidate him—he was bunkered and finally missed a five-foot putt for his five,—but this was the only six on his card. He was out in 35 and home in 36, and when the greens eluded his second shots he chipped with such judgment that he had single putts at no fewer than eight holes. In addition to his eagle, he had five birdies, and his round remained unchallenged throughout the day except by a great effort in the afternoon by E. B. Davenport.

Taylor's 74—39 out and 35 in—was stalwart and steady, but it had its weaker moments with three putts at the fourth, seventh, ninth, and tenth holes. W. Sutton (Mere), who has already had his fill of championship victories—he has won the Cheshire title three times,—was close behind the leaders with 55, which equalled the scratch score and was the result of consistently good play, with an excusable six at the fifth (520 yards) as the only departure from championship standards. But 76's were still able to command respectful notice.

A Rousing Finish

A 76 was attained by G. Sleath, of Wallasey, in a finish which touched the heights and depths of golfing emotion. At the sixteenth he drove into a bunker At the sixteenth he drove into a bunker he had forgotten was there, tried to get out with a heavy iron, and stayed where he was; three putts gave him a seven in sight of the clubhouse. At the seven-teenth his tee shot was only two yards from the pin, and he sank the putt for a two, balm to his wounded spirit. On the same level as Sleath was P. Clarke, a Sale player still in his teens; as youth must be served it had better be stated now that Clarke improved by one strated

Two former champions, J. Abraham (Prestbury) and J. Braid, jun. (Ringway), played together, and with rare companionship shared an adventurous round which brought Braid back in 80 and Abraham in 80. In spite of the presence of four short holes, the first three the pair produced was an eagle by Abraham at the 473-yard thirteenth; he got his bogey at the short seventeenth, which also kindly presented Braid with his only three of the round. The Ringway golfer was present on behalf of his club team, and though he was safely in the qualifiers he did not claim his place.

Re-entering competitive golf after a fairly long absence, J. Woollam, English champion in 1933 and 1935, laboured under the handicap of a recent illness and took 79 in the morning. He improved in the afternoon with 74, which contained as its attractive interludes three threes and a two at the seventeenth; Woollam was one of the few players who conquered this difficult hole.

Bringing in another 71. A, Walker led the qualifiers with a total of 142, being six strokes ahead of Davenport. This time the third was the only blemish on his outward journey, but the ground lost by his six there was recovered by a two at the 257-yard long sixth and a birdie three at the eighth. He was cut in 35 and home in 36. He was playing with Davenport, and even his excellence was dimmed by the brilliance of his partner's homeward half. Davenport from the turn reached the last tee four under fours. His 12-yard putt for a 69. Tragically, he missed the four-foot return putt and the four became a six.

Twenty-seven players with scores up to 162 qualified. Six players tied at 163 for the last five places; a play-off hung over them, but G. Few. of the home club, in obliging a fellow-competitor with a lift to Stockport also obliged his rivals. He was given until 8 30 to turn up, failed to do so, and the other five were in without having to play nine more tiresome holes.
