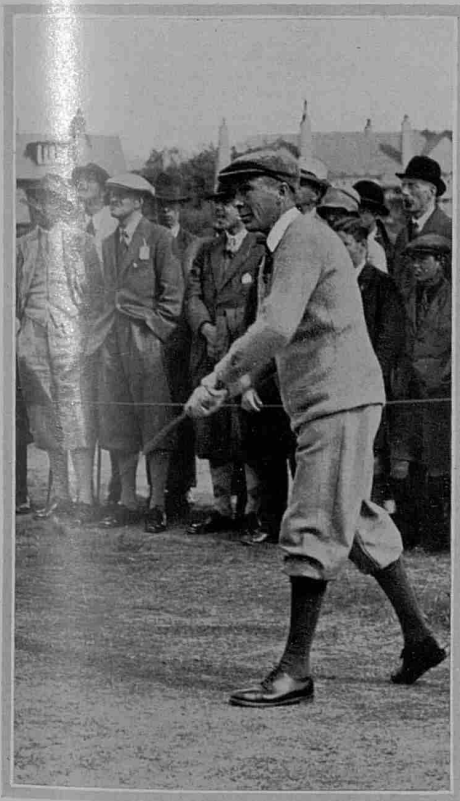


DR. TWEDDELL'S VICTORY: THE AMATEUR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

For the first time a golfer from the Midlands has won the Amateur Championship, and Dr. Tweddell, of Stourbridge, reaped the reward due to him for playing the soundest golf in the meeting. The new champion had not previously come into great prominence in the game, but his methods, the most careful and painstaking imaginable, are not such as to leave room for the possibility of his victory being a lucky one, such as might be achieved by a man playing for the time being above his form. His game is more a solid one than a brilliant, and he is certain to play a big part in international affairs in the future. He beat D. E. Landale in the final by seven up and six to play.
