The third competition for the amateur championship of Cheshire was continued yesterday on the links of the Stockport club at Torkington, and for the first time this year, at any rate in this district, the conditions confirmed the calendar, for play was carried on in a blaze of sunshine that was almost overpowering. He made certain of straightness by using an iron on the tee, and was rewarded, as that straight shot decided the hole.

In the afternoon Hassall and Stoker had an interesting game, which Stoker won at the seventeenth. They were all square playing the third, and Stoker took the lead there through laying a chip shot dead from the edge of the green and through his opponent putting weakly from five feet. He also won the fourth hy playing much the better secand, and from that point Hassall was always fighting an uphill battle, in which what luck there was went against him. Hassall deserved a two at the fifth but had to be content with a half in three, and he became three down at the ninth, where his drive found a bad place which demanded the use of a niblick, after which he saw his putt for a four hit the hole without dropping. Hassall got one back at the fourteenth, but was most allowed another success.

Sidebottom first obtained a lead over Macheth at the third, where the Hale player "fluffed" his second into a bunker. After the fifth, however, Macheth had a slight advantage, which gave him a lead of one hole at the turn. McCall played the best golf of the afternoon, and gave F. M. Bacon no chance at all. He went out in 35, which gave him a lead of five holes and enabled him to win the match four holes later.
