The drive, made on a high, built-up tee, has to be forcibly hit over rough land, whilst only a full second will give the player a view of the green, which is round a corner. The last short hole is over a ravine on to a hill, and at the eighteenth there is an easy entrance to the green for the player who places his drive, whilst for the others considerable skill will be required with the second shot to ensure correct figures. There is a variety about the course which will make it a great attraction to those who desire a day s good golf in one of the prettiest parts of Cheshire. He has earned distinction as a player for his University and Sunningdale, and in constructing new courses he makes it his aim to demand accurate play and no "trick shots."

The green is on the side of a hill, and even after a good drive the second will have to be "cut" to prevent the ball from going over.
