JONES ON THE TRAIL AGAIN

Jones (Upton-by-Chester), the holder, made a determined start at Wallasey yesterday in his attempt to win the Cheshire amateur golf title for the fourth year in succession when in his first round he returned a 69, four better than par. He broke the amateur record for the course, held by F. A. Griffiths (Wallasey), by one stroke,

Jones is 45 and has proved once again that he is as good in strokeplay as he is in matches. He rarely wavered, hitting the ball intelligently on the narrow fairways and putting with great assurance.
